



Coroners Inquest Finds That Dead and Injured Men Were Not Responsible for Accident; Miscalculation

GLOBE, April 24—A verdict was reached yesterday afternoon by the jury which investigated the death of five men when the shrinking stopes in the northwest portion of the Miami mine collapsed a few days ago. The verdict held that the accident was due to miscalculation by the management in taking too much ore out of the stopes.

stopes. Here is the verdict:

"We, the coroner's jury, after taking the evidence, find that Charles Cox came to his death by an air blast caused by the falling of capping in the Miami mine, Miami, Arizona, on April 17, 1913, caused by the miscalculation of the management in carrying too much ore out of the rooms or stopes, owing to the fact that the ground was considered safe and we claim that maid Charles Cox was helpless and in no way responsible for the accident as it came without warning to him." to him.'

This verdict applies to the cases of the other four men who were killed in the disaster.
