

Scores Reported Dead And Injured

INDIANAPOLIS, July 6— (AP) —Indiana's celebration of Independence Day was safe and sane as far as the use of fireworks was concerned, only a few minor injuries being reported, but more than a score of holiday pleasure seekers lost their lives in automobile accidents, drownings and storms.

Reports of 12 fatalities throughout the state came to The Associated Press yesterday to be added to the eight deaths recorded on the highways and in streams Saturday and Sunday.

Three persons were killed near Logansport and five injured when a Pennsylvania railroad train struck an automobile early Monday. Those killed were Mrs. Owen Pelsor, 45 years old; Mary Pelsor, eight years old, and Mrs. Antoinette Meagher, 38 years old, all resident of Denham, Ind.

Velma West, 13 years old, of Benton, Ill., died last night at Fort Wayne from the effects of injuries suffered earlier in the day when the automobile in which she was riding collided with a car driven by O. A. Clark, of Columbus, Ohio.

Mrs. Leil Miller, 76 years old, of Harlan, Ind., was killed at Antwerp, Ohio, when she was struck by a machine driven by Charles Weir of Detroit, Mich.

Carl R. Cox, 26 years old, of Indianapolis, was fatally injured when his machine went over an embankment near Edinburg, Ind.

Russell Smith, 19 years old, of Evansville, in the Wabash river at New Harmony.

Wesley Gaylor, 30 years old, of Muncie, in quarry near Muncie.

George Wayt, 17 years old, of Columbus, Indiana, in White river near Columbus.
