MAURICE MILLER, 12, DROWNS NEAR HANOVER

HANOVER, July 25 .- Maurice Milhanover, July 25.—Maurice Miller, Jr., 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Miller, Green Springs, drowned yesterday afternoon near his home in the water-filled quarry at the plant of the Bethlehem Mines corporation, about three miles north of Hanover. Death, according to the certificate signed by Dr. Edgar Mildental drowning.

The body was recovered yesterday afternoon at 2:10 o'clock, just 20 minutes after it disappeared. William Kepner, Allegheny avenue, Hanover, an employe at the mines and an expert swimmer, searched for the body found it, and removed it from the quarry after a search made by others was unsuccessful.

A slight pulse was noticed when the body was recovered and Dr. C. G. Gray and Dr. Henry Goeken, Hanover, was rushed to the scene. The physicians used the pulmotor on the body until after 3 o'clock but life had become extinct, although slight pulsations on occasions renewed hope of resuscitation.

Young Miller had been in the water with Samuel Richstein, the latter a son of Mr. and Mrs. Ulysses Richstein, neighbors of the Miller family. Miller was not an experienced swimmer. He waded into the quarry, and it is believed, stepped into a pocket in the rocky bottom, and then went under.

His companion, unable to be of aid, went to the store of C. H. Bittinger

ler, county caroner, was due to acci- and summoned assistance. Mr. Bittinger went to the scene and waded in the water in an attempt to find the body but was unsuccessful. Mr. Bittinger cannot swim and had to abandon the search when the water covered him to his neck. C. R. Orndorff and Hugh McIlwain, officials at the quarry. also assisted in the search. Finally William Kepner was called and after a brief search found the body.

Thirty-two years ago Irvin Harman drowned in the same quarry hole, and since then the cavity has been known as Harman's quarry. It had been worked some years ago and recently had been cleaned as operations of the Bethlehem Mines corporation neared it.

The victim is survived by his parents; two sisters, Relda and Gloria, and one brother, Allen, all at home. Funeral Director William A. Feiser. Hanover, has taken charge of the body and is preparing it for burial. The funeral will be held Thursday morning at 10 o'clock at the Green Springs church. Burial will be in Mt. Olivet cemetery, Abbottstown.
