## British Labor Party Wins Out In Voting Tests

## Indonesia Is Facing Revolt

The British Labor government today squeaked through two crucial voting tests in the House of Commons by a five-vote margin.

It was Prime Minister Attlee's narrowest escape so far since Labor was returned last February with a shaky majority.

The Conservatives joined with Liberals in voting against a government proposal to increase the gasoline tax and impose a new purchase tax on trucks.

If the government had been defeated on these issues it probably would have forced a new general election.

The newly born Indonesian central government is faced with another revolt. Reliable sources in Jakarta, the Federal capital, said Saparatists on the island of Ambon in East Indonesia have proclaimed an independent state of the South Moluccas.

The Ambonese have long been the most loyal and fiercest fighters enrolled in the Netherlands East Indies army. This was the Federal government's fourth revolt in its few months of existence and from all accounts it may

A 14-year-old North Kennebunkport youth was reported in "satisfactory" condition at the Trull hospital today by his physician after he had been injured when he was trapped by a rock pile avalanche in an abandoned quarry.

Paul Delage, son of Mrs. Odilon Delage, Mountain road, North Kennebunkport, suffered a fractured thigh and internal injuries when large stones pinned him down.

Another boy, Albert Landry, 14, who was playing with the Delage boy and other companions in the quarry at the time, had a thumb amputated, it was reported from North Kennebunkport.

Walter and James Chapman fled to their homes in terror after the accident while Maurice Delage, 11, brother of the most seriously injured youth, stood by weeping unable to extract Paul.

However, the presence of mind of Raymond Landry, 14, may have saved Delage's life. He freed the youth and his brother, Albert, and then went home to get help from his family in removing the injured youths from the scene.

Raymond, however, was badly shaken up from the accident and was treated yesterday by his family physician.

He reportedly has been suffering from nose bleeding since the incident.

The boys were playing atop a rock pile in the quarry, it was reported, when the pile started to roll and dragged them down with it Delage was pinned down in the avalanche.
