Nine Die In Ohio Holiday Mishaps Traffic Kills Six, **Two Persons Drown** By The Associated Press Although comparatively light traffic was reported throughout the state, the automobile was still the big killer on Ohio's Fourth of July holiday, which saw nine ac-cidental deaths — including six in traffic and two by drowning. No one was reported killed or injured by fireworks. The State Highway Patrol credited rainy, cloudy weather over much of the state with keeping traffic light. The same conditions apparently kept Ohioans from flocking to beaches and swimming pools. A swimmer at an aban-doned quarry near Columbus and a Virginia man who tried to es-cape from an auto stalled in a flooded underpass in Portsmouth were the only reported drowning deaths. A 60-year-old man was killed in a fall from a railroad freight car.
