

**TWO STUDENTS
DROWN WHILE
SKIN DIVING
Die in 70 Ft. Quarry
Near Racine**

Racine, Wis., April 15 [Special]—Two students at a Chicago technical institute who drove here for a day of skin diving in an abandoned quarry were drowned today while at least 50 other skin divers, many of them also from Chicago, were swimming and diving nearby.

The quarry has been in use about three years as a site for skin diving and other sports under the name of Aqualand. Divers pay a \$2 fee to use the facilities and have thronged the place on week-ends thruout the winter, submerging thru holes in the ice.

Students at De Vry Tech

The victims were identified as David Perry, 21, of Ionia, Mich., and Allen Katcher, 21, of 5172 West Monroe st., Chicago. Both were students at De Vry Technical institute, 4141 Belmont av.

The bodies were found in 40 feet of water by other skin divers who began a search when the youths were missed. Coroner Bernard Evenson said it was probable that one of them had lost his mask and gone into a panic, grappling with the other when he sought to assist him.

The quarry is spring-fed and in places has a depth of 70 feet. Authorities said these were the first fatalities since skin divers have been using the place.

CLASSMATES AT DE VRY

Katcher and Perry were classmates at DeVry Tech where they had enrolled in January in a two year electronics program.

Katcher, who was a 1959 graduate of Austin High school, was the son of Mrs. Faye Katcher, a widow, who is employed in the medical department at the Cook county welfare department's office at 25 S. Damen av.

Perry was rooming at the residence of M. C. Hochlener at 3105 N. Francisco av., with Lar-

fracture of the left knee. He was reported in good condition in St. Anne's hospital.

Mahoney said that damage to the destroyed trucks was estimated at \$400,000, and that there was \$50,000 damage to the building. Extra alarms were called because companies slated to respond to the blaze were fighting the fire at the Tivoli hotel.

\$100,000 Damage

Chief Fire Marshal Raymond J. Daley estimated damage in the hotel at \$100,000. He said the fire apparently started in a fourth floor corridor and spread thru upper stories of the four story building.

**GERMAN GROUP
FIGHTS KOSHER
SLAUGHTERING**

HAMBURG, Germany, April 15 (AP)—An anti-Jewish remark shouted by a delegate today received wide applause at the annual meeting of the German Society for the Protection of Animals. The shout came after Dr. H. Korkhaus, vice president of the society, had given a lecture criticizing Jewish ritual slaughtering as a cruelty.

"They [the Jews] should go where they came from," a voice exclaimed in the room, which was darkened while slides were projected onto a screen. At that, most of the delegates clapped their hands, forcing Korkhaus to stop talking. Then he commented:

"I would not say it that way. One should rather point out that in a democracy everyone should submit himself to the majority." A resolution adopted at the end of the meeting called on the Bonn parliament to initiate legislation making Kosher slaughtering a punishable crime.
