

Girl Swimmer Drowns In Quarry Near Oneida

A 13-year-old Milwaukee girl drowned early Tuesday afternoon in an abandoned stone quarry near Oneida in spite of efforts of five companions to aid her.

She was Margie Anderson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Anderson and granddaughter of Oscar Archquette, Oneida, Rt. 1, whom she was visiting.

The incident occurred about 1 p.m. at a quarry owned by Roland Vanden Berg. The quarry is several hundred yards off County Highway U, about 1 1/2 miles north of the community of Oneida.

Five Others Swimming

According to authorities, the Anderson girl was swimming with Harlan Ninham, 9, and his sisters, Telka, 15 and Debbie, 13, children of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Ninham, Oneida, Rt. 1, and their cousins, Joanne, 9, and Harold Ninham Jr., 8, children of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Ninham also of Milwaukee.

Margie dived into the quarry and shouted to the others that she couldn't move her leg, apparently stricken by a cramp, county police said.

Harlan, Telka and Joanne tried to pull her to shore, but she struggled and went under.

The children then ran out to the road and told a passing farmer of the mishap. He went to the quarry but could not find the girl, authorities said. The farmer then reported the drowning to the Brown County Sheriff-Traffic Dept.

Body Found in 10 Feet

The body was recovered an hour later in about 10 feet of water, 12 feet from the edge of the quarry by Brown County Traffic chief Larry Koeppen and Officer Wayne Truttman with the use of skin diving equipment.

The body was taken to the Ryan Funeral Home, West De Pere.

The quarry, 50 by 100 yards, has not been worked since the winter of 1960, according to Vanden Berg. It has been posted with "No Swimming," and "Not Safe" signs.

Sheriff Warns Trespassers

Sheriff William Swanson, also at the scene, said he will request all quarry owners in Brown County to give his office authority to arrest swimmers for trespassing.

"This is the second quarry

drowning in this area in a little more than two weeks," he said, referring to the drowning of Joseph Kane, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Kane, Denmark, Rt. 3, in a quarry just over the Brown County line in Manitowoc County June 30.

Swanson said he will request authorization from landowners to arrest all swimmers as trespassers to prevent further tragedies in unsupervised and dangerous areas.

Forecasts Newspaper Ad Boom

MONTREAL, Canada (AP) — J. Warren McClure, president of the Newspaper Advertising Executives Assn., has predicted "this decade will see the greatest boom in newspaper advertising in all newspaper history."

In an address at the association's summer meeting, McClure, publisher of the Burlington (Vt.) Free Press, said: "The press must be alert, however, to the danger signals coming out of Washington and must play an even more important role than ever before in alerting the newspaper readers of America to these dangers."

Could Halt Progress

McClure declared that a "managed economy" out of Washington could stem the tide of economic progress in the United States and "end in business chaos."

A "managed economy," he said, would create "economic dictatorship," he added:

"The farm program, and the mess that it is, dramatically illustrates that not even the Republicans can successfully manage a segment of the economy."

Economy Big Business

"If Ike couldn't manage the farm program with his group of astute business advisors, what can we expect from J.F.K. and his coterie of Harvard professors if they attempt to manage the biggest business in the world — the U.S. economy?"

"The 'debt-be-damned' attitude in Washington isn't going to help matters, either. Neither is the idea that you can turn a Washington faucet and wash away economic problems or pressure business solutions."

Polio on Gradual Decline in State

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — What was once a dreaded illness that was as sure as summer and late fall is becoming more slowly a rare disease.

The state Board of Health reported that there has been only one polio case reported so far this year compared to three at this time last year. There was a total of 29 cases of polio reported in 1961, 26 of the cases of the paralytic type.
