

U-T Professor, 15 Killed In Tenn. A

Thousands of persons sought relief from the hot, muggy weekend weather and, as usually feared at this time of year, increased outdoor activity brought more accidental deaths.

Water accidents were responsible for three of the 16 weekend fatalities. Traffic accounted for 11.

Dr. Harry H. Ambrose, 44, University of Tennessee hydraulics professor, was electrocuted Sunday when he accidentally touched a high voltage line with an irrigation pipe he was moving from a garden to the lawn at his home.

A dynamite blast Sunday killed Ancil McFarland, 54, of near Jellico. Police said he was apparently attempting to dynamite a pond for fish and the charge went off before he could get out of range.

Sammy Lee Baldwin, 18, of Newborn, Ga., jumped in the water at an abandoned rock quarry near Portland, Tenn., Sunday and failed to surface. A skin diver recov-

ered the body in 30 feet of water.
