

Man Drowns

Car Crashes Fatal To 5

Maine's highway traffic toll climbed swiftly Sunday to 132, a record for the date, as weekend accidents claimed five lives in widely separated areas. Drowning claimed another life.

Latest accidents were at Hudson, Windham and Winslow, all on Sunday while Saturday crashes took lives at Atkinson and Winslow. Two of the victims were pedestrians.

Houston Eyes New Mosquitoes

HOUSTON (UPI) — The city health officer said Sunday the next few days will tell whether a new crop of mosquitoes may pose a fresh threat to control efforts against the sleeping sickness epidemic.

Daily rains that hurt mosquito control spraying efforts Aug. 22-26 gave the insects new breeding places and the 10 days' incubation period for mosquitoes ends next week.

"New mosquitoes are about due from the rains," Dr. C. A. Pigford, city health director, said. "We are emphasizing it is still quite necessary for individual householders to do what they can to eliminate breeding places for mosquitoes."

Cleo Twisters Hit Carolinas

LAURINBURG, N. C. (AP) — Tropical storm Cleo, dying as she sloshed through the Carolinas, was strong enough to throw a one-two punch of tornados at this south-central North Carolina city of 10,000.

A little twister Sunday—it hurt no one, but damaged roofs of some homes—followed by 13 hours a Saturday blockbuster. The big wind ripped a three-mile destructive path and caused damages estimated at \$750,000 by the highway patrol.

It overturned seven of 10 trailers in a trailer park, and uprooted a tree that crashed another trailer. But luckily not many people were home in the park. A woman and

Killed in Sunday accidents were Mrs. Doris Mailman, 54, of Hudson, at Hudson; Paul D. Dumont, 8, of Winslow, at Winslow; and Mrs. Nathaniel Shaw of Westbrook, at Windham.

Losing their lives Saturday were Donald F. Campbell, 24, of Guilford, at Atkinson; and David Ladd, 6, of Winslow, at Winslow.

Drowned Saturday was Ronald Danis, 25, of Biddeford, in a quarry at Arundel.

In the Hudson crash which saw two cars collide head on, the Mailman woman was a passenger in a car operated by her son, Richard, 26. Driver of the other vehicle was John Forbes, 33, an airman stationed at Dow Air Force Base in Bangor.

County Attorney Howard M. Foley of Bangor, who is investigating along with state police, said the accident occurred in late afternoon as the Mailman car was headed north and the Forbes vehicle was traveling south.

Forbes was alone but others in the Mailman vehicle were George Mailman, 62, husband of the victim; Mrs. Richard Mailman, 21, and the younger couple's two sons.

Members of the Richard Mailman family were all treated at the Eastern Maine General Hospital and then released while George Mailman was admitted for a head injury, possible internal injuries and lacerations of the face and scalp. Forbes was also admitted at the Eastern Maine General Hospital with cuts and bruises.

The county attorney said both vehicles were demolished.

Hospital officials said George Mailman was not on the danger list.

Investigating were Sgt. Francis Woodhead, and Troopers Walter Eugley and Ralph Holmes and Detective Carl Buchanan, all of the state police.

In the Winslow accident Sunday, the Associated Press quoted authorities as saying the Dumont boy was struck and

killed near his home by a car driven by his father's cousin. The driver, Louis P. Pelletier, 21, of Winslow, told police the boy darted in front of his car. The boy was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Dumont.

In the Windham crash, Mrs. Shaw died when two cars collided head on on the River Road. Her 71-year old husband, identified by police as driver of one car, was at the Maine Medical Center in Portland.

Driver of the other car, Royal Vosmus, 26, of South Windham, was also at the hospital.

Danis drowned Saturday as he swam fully-clothed in an abandoned water-filled quarry in nearby Arundel.

The Sherriff's Department said Danis and six companions had gone there to swim, and Danis waded in first. The body was recovered in 25 feet of water.

The Ladd boy was fatally injured by a car as he played on the sidewalk near his home in Winslow. A neighbor, 11-year-old Susan Hachey, was taken to a hospital in adjacent Waterville for observation.

Police said the car struck the boy head-on but gave the girl only a glancing blow.

Campbell was killed Saturday night when his motorcycle left the Dyer Road in Atkinson and went into a ditch.
