

#### A Cave-in.

Escanaba, Mich., April 11.—A cave-in occurred in the Keel Ridge mine, between Quinnesec and Iron Mountain, soon after 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, carrying down the engine house, and eight men, as follows: Patrick Egan, Richard Williams, W. Henderson, John Morris, Thomas James, Edward Wicks, William Jeffrey, and William Pollard. Up to 8 o'clock last night only one man, (Wicks), had been rescued, and he was fatally injured. Three of the men were on the surface, and none work at work in the mine.

The mine is located two miles west of Quinnesec Cave, and embraced a space of 75 by 150 feet. Besides the men engulfed it took in the mine machinery, including four large boilers, they falling a distance of two hundred feet.

At the present writing it is believed that all the men have lost their lives. It is estimated that the recovery of the bodies will require a week or more.

Quinnesec, Mich., April 11.—The Keel Ridge mine, owned by the Emmet Mining company, caved in on Tuesday afternoon at 1 o'clock, burying nine men who were working on the surface. The mine commenced caving last Friday in the second level, when about 200 tons fell in. The danger was recognized by the company at once and all work below ground was suspended. There was no one below at the time of the catastrophe. The buried men's names were Dick Williams the time keeper, Ed. Wicks, W. Jeffreys, John Morris, Thos. James, Wm. Poltock, A. Helmer and Pat. Egan, all married men except Dick Williams. At 5 o'clock cries were heard at the mouth of the main shaft and Ed. Wicks was finally found in a drift with a broken rib and thigh. He spoke intelligibly on being taken out but soon wandered in his mind. The company are using every exertion to get the other bodies and are putting in hoisting machinery as fast as possible. The large and one small boiler were also swallowed up in the awful pit. There is no hope of the other men being alive. The doctors have hopes of Wicks' recovery.
