How the Victims of the Giant Powder Explosion at Bull Domingo Mine Met Death.

DENVER, Nov. 15 .- A Silver Cliff special to the News says: The removal of the dead miners from the Bull Domingo mine began at 6 o'clock last night, the last being brought to the surface about midnight. Robert Mc-Gregor and Tom Armstrong alternated in going down to the 500-foot shaft. was attached to pulleys to let the brave corpse was bound to down. then the a loop of with arms encircling body, and was brought to the surface by a steady pull.
