

Kettle Creek Mine Horror.

RENOVO, Pa., Nov. 6.—The coroner held an inquest at the scene of the Kettle Creek mine horror yesterday, but the jury has not rendered a verdict yet. The cause of the explosion is still a mystery. The bodies of the dead were buried to-day. Of the sixteen dead, thirteen have no relatives in this country, and they were buried in the cemetery here. The others were taken to North Bend Snowshed and Wellsville, N. Y. When the bodies were discovered after the explosion they were mostly found many feet away from where they had been working. One, that of a boy 19 years old was in a sitting posture against the side of the mine. His right hand held his left foot in a firm grip, and it was with difficulty that the fingers were opened. The body of Michal Curren, which was blown 150 feet beyond the mine, was lodged between two logs, and in his right hand he held the handle of the shovel with which he was working when the explosion occurred.
