## A FATAL MINE EXPLOSION.

Three Men Killed and Five Injured by an Accident Saturday Night.

Mount Carmel Shaft No. 5 at Chicopee, Situated in The Southern Part of This County was the Scene of the horror.

Saturday evening about seven o'clock some of our people had their attention attracted toward the south by a strange light that seemed to illuminate the heaven. They knew at once that something unusual had taken place. In a very short time the strange phenomena was explained when word came over the telephone, from Pittsburg, that a mine explosion had taken place at Chicopee. The first report stated that one hundred and fifty men worked in the mine and the inference drawn was that there were that many in the mine at the time of the explosion. This was horrible to contemplate. But fortunately the accident happened at a time when only seven men The day shift had were in the mine. come out and the night men had not However it is gone down to work. sad enough.

The dead are Anton Weinberger, Chas. Winters and John Possing, shot firers. Those injured are James Zimmerman, Ben Shirard, Robt Boyd, Joe Zeitter and John Tavernaro

Immediately after the explosion hundreds and thousands of people from Pittsburg and the surrounding country began to gather at the scene of death and wreckage. The top of the main tower over the shaft had been blown off and loose timbers and corrogated iron were scattered in every direction, Also the fan in the air shaft had been damaged, which caused some delay in getting fresh air into the mine. But as soon as it was thought safe to venture into the shaft, rescuing parties went down to search for the dead and dieing.

Three bodies were found and taken out that night, but it was almost noon Sunday before the last one was found. And strange to say, Jim Zimmerman, the last one found was alive, after being buried beneath an avalanch of smoke and sulfuric fumes for fifteen hours.

All day Sunday people continued to come and go by the hundreds and thousands.

The cause of the explosion is not known, but most men who are capable of judging are of the opinion that it was caused by what is known among miners as a "windy shot." Others say the mine had gas in it. Some have one theory and some anothers. The coroner impanneled a jury Sunday morning and held an inquest over the dead bodies. A number of witnesses were examined, but nothing definite could be learned as to who was responsible for the disaster.

"The verdict of the jury in the coroner's investigation was returned Monday and the evidence of a number of witnesses was taken. Among those who testified were J.C. Fletcher Superintendent of the Mt. Carmel Coal companies mines at Chicopee and Frontenac; James Zimmerman, the man who lived in the mine for fifteen hours after the explosion and escaped alive; Tom Flynn, who was among the rescuing party; State Mine Inspector McGrath and many others. The testimony being all in, the jury returned the following verdict: We the jury find that the dead bodies are those of John Possing, Charles Winters and Anton Weinbarger, all shotfirers at No.5 of the Mt. Carmel Coal Company; that the said John Possing, Charles Winters and Auton Weinbarger came to their death by

an explosion caused by gas generated from two windy shots supposed to have been fired by said John Possing, that the cause of said Possing's death was the result of burns received from the flame of said shots; that the cause of the death of Charles Winters and Anton Weinbarger was asphyxia resulting from the effects of said shots fired by said Possing. We further find that the said explosion was intensified by dust gathered in the rooms where the said Possing had fired previous shots in rapid succession.
