
ENTOMBED MINER RESCUED.

Another Man Taken Out Alive, But Soon Expires.

CENTRALIA, Pa., July 15.—At a late hour Friday night a rescuing party penetrated the blockade in a gangway of a coal operation near the Lehigh Coal Company's colliery at this place, and when several men crawled through the opening they shouted for John Shutt, of Bucks Patch, and George Bulla, of this place, the latter men having been entombed since noon. The rescuers were overjoyed to hear the voice of Shutt. He said he was not injured.

Shutt was a dozen feet distant, imprisoned between timber and coal. In a few minutes he was liberated and taken to the surface. The rescuers pushed along the gangway and found Bulla with a huge piece of coal on his breast. He had been pinioned to the ground since the gangway closed in. He was still alive, but could not talk, and as soon as the surface was reached he died. He is survived by a wife and several children.
