## MINERS ARE ENTOMBED.

## Hope of Reaching the Imprisoned Men Is Abandoned.

Fredericktown, Pa., Oct. 14.—The six miners entombed in the Clyde mine yesterday, as the result of a fire damp explosion, have not yet been rescued. The men are entombed 1,500 feet from the pit mouth and hopes of reaching them alive are not entertained.

Two others were seriously burned in an explosion in the fan house at the breaking out of the fire in the mine, one of them so fearfully that he will not live. The imprisoned men are:

George Kelly. Homer Harvey. Richard Marsh. Richard Mony. Bronsin Lonzo. Cesto Renardini.

The burned men are:

L. D. Wood, burned about face and back; may die.

Robert Virgin, frightfully burned about the body; cannot live.

Nearly 200 men were in the mine when the fire started. Its exact origin is not known, but it is supposed it was caused by a wire becoming short circuited, and igniting the brattice cloths, which serve to create drafts by means of which the mine is kept free from foul air. All but the six men named escaped.

It is believed that the only hope of extinguishing the fire is by flooding the mine.
