As the bodies were brought to the surface public scenes were enacted...

Many Messages Sent. All last night and until an early hour this morning the mine office at Virginia was crowded with people...

Fears of Decomposition. The explosion which caused such a destruction of life occurred Monday afternoon about 6 o'clock.

Could Not Live. Old miners who have given up nearly all their life to work in mines state that it would be impossible for a man...

for the miners at Virginia, a practical miner, Ed Mitchell, of Bessemer.

The owner's jury met this morning in Bessemer and after reviewing those last night and early this morning, returned to Virginia to learn the official report.

Supervisor A. W. Reed, Frank Howe Hartig and other officials discuss the matter from the mine. Officials deplore the awful catastrophe.

The little telegraph office of Virginia has been operating ever since the accident. The operator of city has handled many telegrams, relatives and friends of those who were not in the mines at the time of the explosion...

Notwithstanding the accident is now two days old, many visitors are still coming to the mine...

Among the hardest workers about the mine is Jerry Frazier, deputy sheriff, with headquarters in Bessemer. He has been away from his home since his arrival an hour or so after the explosion...

Many of the men at Virginia last night were weary and worn out from their long stay in the mine...

The bodies of Kirby and Ira Powell, sons of P. J. Powell, of Dozier, were sent in Dozier & Anderson's dead wagon to Dozier. These two young men were well-known throughout the county...

Mr. Hartley Talks. At 1 o'clock this morning Frank Dean Hartley also asked as to his list of the number of men in the mines at that time...

Check Weighman's Sheet. The check of the weighman shows that there were ninety-three men on the afternoon of Monday.

Provisions Scarce. Considerable complaint was heard at an early hour this morning at the lack of provisions. This matter will be remedied today and plenty of provisions will be on hand for the workers...

Force of Explosion. The force of the explosion in the mine was not understood when it first broke out. Several incidents have been brought to light during the past day and night which demonstrate what a little show for life was given the men...
