"Bluefield, W. Va., Jan. 4.—Special.—Again the earth has trembled and that substance in which there is more ergy and destruction to the atom than is in dynamite to the pound, fire damp, or mine gas, let go its awful engines of disaster today, and in an instant twenty-one toilling miners had crossed from time to eternity.

"Never before in the history of this field has there been such a fearful disaster, save one, and of that the victims sleep in the cemetery at Pocahontus.
