

2 MORE BODIES RECOVERED FROM MINE

VICTIMS MANGLED
BEYOND RECOGNITION

Nine Men Positively Known to
Have Perished in Disaster
at Blossburg Coal Camp
in Northern New Mexico.

Raton, N. M., Oct. 7.—Two more bodies were taken from the Dutchman mine this evening. They are not as yet identified. This makes a total of six recovered. The list of known dead so far is as follows:

The bodies identified are those of Grindle, Janeski and Cameron. The remains were today shipped to Trinidad as also was Grindle. Cameron was the brother of the superintendent of the mines at Dawson, another coal camp, south of Raton. He was a married man, the only one so far known of the victims. One unknown body has been interred at this place supposed to be an Italian. It is now thought that but ten men were in the mine at the time. Commencing tomorrow the rescue work will be conducted in three eight-hour shifts instead of two twelve hours as now and the company will work as many men on the shifts as is possible to obtain. The men are now working ahead of the air as far as they dare go. At the mine deputy sheriffs are on guard and no one is allowed to approach the portal without being challenged. The utmost reticence prevails among the men about the mine and very little information is given out. It was rumored at the mine today that there was hopes of finding John Berry, the foreman, alive. He was acting as fire boss at the time of the explosion and was an experienced gas man, hence the thought that possibly he might have gotten to a place of safety. The body of W. F. Cameron was terribly mutilated about the neck, the head being nearly severed from the body by a jagged wound evidently caused by a flying rock and the man doubtless bled to death.

Adam Smith, one of the men reported to be dead, turned up very much alive this evening. It seems that Smith had laid off and said nothing to any one and it was supposed, of course, that he was in the mine.
