Eight Miners Killed Instantly--Six Seriously Injured but Their Recovery Is Hoped for-Bodies of Dead Were Terribly Mangled and Burned--Identification by Particles of Clothing.

This means that a shot, thage is to the effect that all the put in to break down a quantity of coal for removal later did not explode in the usual fashion but merely fizzled, raising a cloud of highly combustible coal dust. This dust was doubtless ignited by the explosion of another shot and instantly death had done its grewsome work.
On every hand were abundant

on every hand were abundant evidences of the terrific force of the explosion. The bodies of some of the dead were blown againt the walls of the mine with such force as to flatten them almost beyond, recognition. In one instance, at least, a dead body was identified only by par-ticles of clothing adhering to the mangled flesh. The body of one miner who was coming out of the mouth of the mine when the explosion occurred was shot a hundred yards into the air as from the mouth of a cannon and broken by the fall. In the case of some of the injured, small stones were driven into their flesh like bullets and had to be extracted with the surgeon's knife.

Even the sound of the explosion spread terror throughout the mining camp. It must be left to the imagination to picture the distressing scenes which follow-

> thage is to the effect that all the six injured miners will recover, except Villanuza, whose chances are not considered good. company officials are doing all they can in caring for him and the other injured, and are spar-ing fo expense in providing for the future of the bereaved families. All the mines of the camp were shut down on New Year's day on account of the funerals, but have since resumed operations at the request of the miners themselves, who think work the best means of relieving the nervous strain under which they have been since the disaster. The mine was not injured by the explosion.
