FIVE KILLED IN CAVE-IN.

**Hungarians Caught in Slide at Troy
Slate Quarry.**

TROY, N. Y., April 13.—Five Hungarians—Michael Fosky, Simeon Topeka, Thaddeus Dewtk, Steve Saultes, and George Kaymua—were killed to-day in a cave-in at the slate quarry of Owen W. Owne's son at Granville, and five other workmen had narrow escapes. The bodies are covered with slate from 5 to 45 feet deep.

Frost leaving the ground, it is thought, caused the slide.

DEAD IN QUARRY PLACED AT FIVE

WEST PAWLET, Vt., April 15.—All of the quarrymen at work when a landslide overwhelmed them in a slate quarry near the line between West Pawlet and Granville, N. Y., on Tuesday have now been accounted for, and it is definitely known that five men lost their lives. The body of one was recovered Tuesday night, another man was rescued alive yesterday morning, but died later in the day, and the three other bodies were recovered today.
