18 MEN KILLED BY EXPLOSION IN Y. & O. MINE AT AMSTERDAM, 7 MAKE MIRACULOUS ESCAPE

**ACCIDENT CAUSED BY GAS IN THE MINE—SIX
BODIES WERE RECOVERED—SEARCH WILL
BE MADE BY EXPERTS FOR OTHERS.**

ALL AMSTERDAM IS IN MOURNING

Many Families of the Jefferson County Town Are To-
day Without a Head—One of the Neighbor-
hood's' Worst Mine Disasters.

Amsterdam, O., April 22.—(Special.)
—Eighteen men were probably instantly killed and one seriously injured in the worst mine disaster in the history of Jefferson county, when the town was shaken at 10 o'clock last night by a terrific gas explosion in the Young & Ohio Coal company's mine. The explosion occurred 315 feet below the surface, but the force of the impact stirred the entire town. According to the most recent reports but seven men escaped from the mine alive, and one of them is seriously injured. Their escape is considered miraculous.

FRANCE WELCOMES ROOSEVELT

Crowds Cheer and Greet the
Party.

**PRESIDENT LOANS HIS
PRIVATE BOX.**

Ovation at Theater Amount-
ed to a Rousing
Celebration.

Paris, April 22.—No reigning sovereign ever received a more enthusiastic welcome to Paris than did Theodore Roosevelt, the former President of the United States yesterday.

He reached here at half-past seven this morning and was greeted by the president of the republic and the cabinet, American Ambassador Bacon, M. Jusserand, the French ambassador at Washington, and a great concourse of people, which the cordon of troops surrounding the railway station had difficulty in holding in check.

After luncheon at the American embassy, Colonel Roosevelt called upon President Fallieres and Foreign Minister Pichon, who immediately afterward paid return visits to the embassy.

Part of the afternoon was devoted to private engagements, and this evening Mr. Roosevelt was given a ovation at the Comedie Francaise where he made his first real public appearance in Paris, occupying the presidential box, which had been placed at his disposal by M. Fallieres.

STITUTIONAL.**

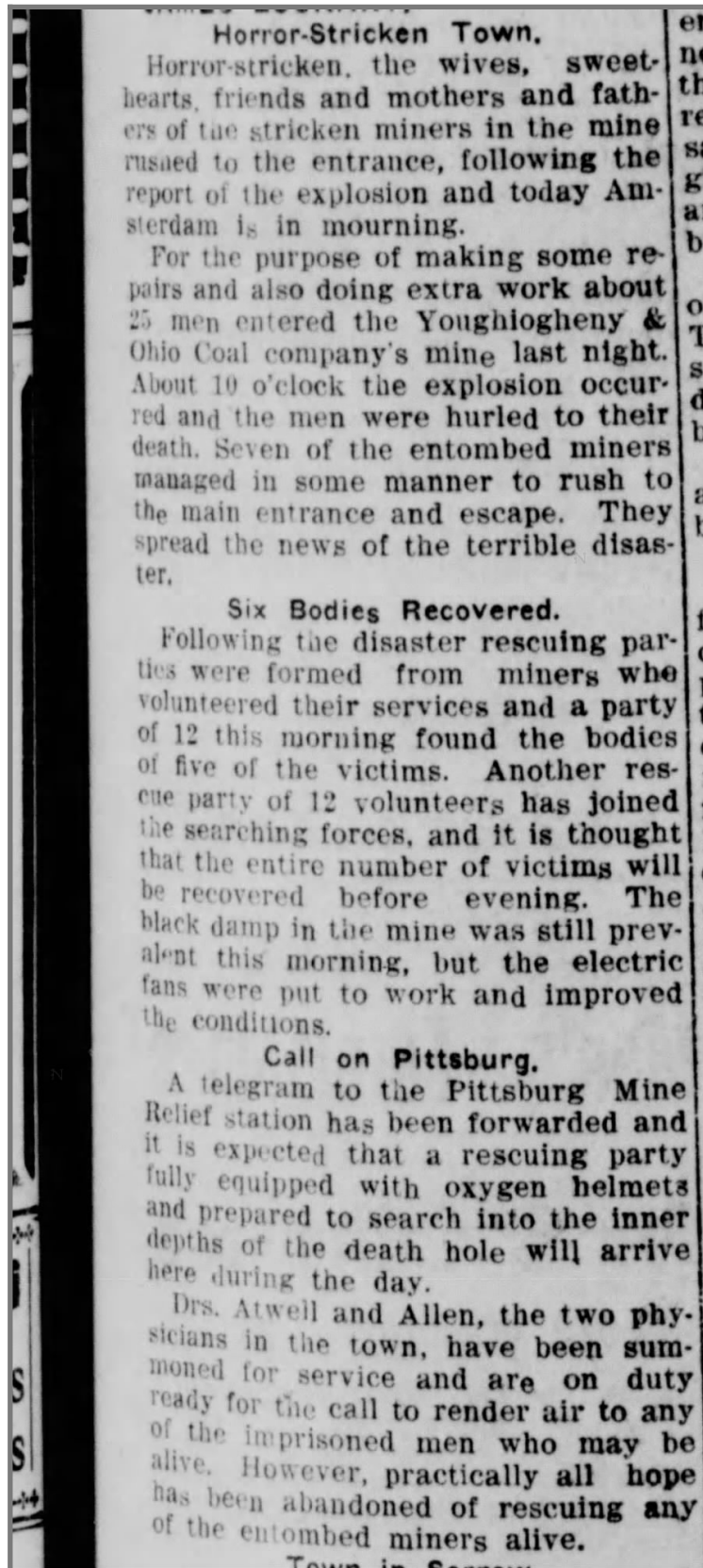
**Anderson, Author of Bill,

"The question is, shall the bill pass notwithstanding the veto of the governor?" Speaker Granville W. Moo-

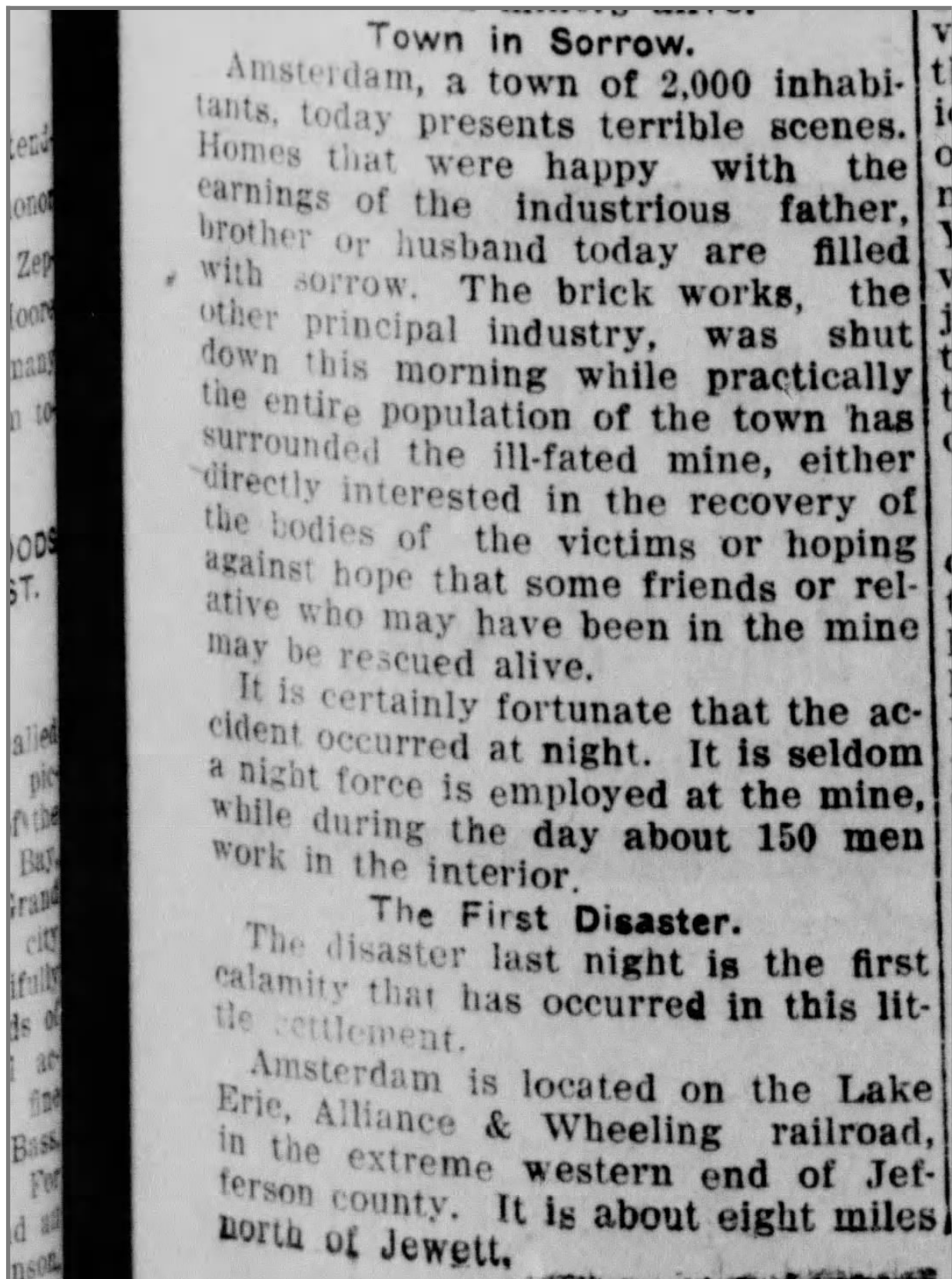
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
