

Bury Miners In a Trench

Funeral of Victims of Amsterdam Explosion Will Be Held
This Afternoon.

THREE ARE FOUND ALIVE.

STEUBENVILLE, O., April 23.—Twelve of the 15 victims of the Amsterdam mine disaster of Thursday evening will be buried to-morrow afternoon in the Union cemetery, in Amsterdam. The funeral will be public and will be attended by miners from all over that section of the country. The three other victims will be buried in Dillonvale, O.

Since the bodies were recovered they have lain in the town hall, and to-morrow Rev. R. L. Houston, of the Presbyterian church, and Rev. James Sullivan, of East Springfield, will conduct the services in the cemetery, as it is not thought the town hall is large enough to hold the crowd which will attend. The victims will be buried in a long trench. The bodies of three Italian miners will be taken to Dillonvale, where services will be held in the Catholic church.

The last of the victims was taken from the mine at 5 o'clock this afternoon. It was the body of Louis Jacomillo. The body was badly mutilated.

The finding alive of Louis Benedict, Mello Porcella and Paul Tobacco early this morning is regarded as a miracle. The men had been in the mine for 30 hours after the explosion. Rescuers had located their bodies last evening, but they showed no signs of life, and were left lying where found until better arrangements could be made for removing them from the mine.

Practically all of the mining experts have left Amsterdam, but will return next week to complete their investigation. The northern part of the mine, which was but slightly wrecked, will be put in shape for operation early next week. It is believed the entire mine can be put in shape for operation within a week or 10 days.

Coroner Foster stated to-night that the inquest would probably start the latter part of next week. It will be held in Amsterdam.
