

TWELVE MEN BURIED IN ONE GRAVE

**Five Thousand Persons Attend
Funeral of Mine Victims at
Amsterdam.**

Steubenville, O., April 25.—With impressive services, attended by about 5,000 persons, the remains of twelve of the miner victims of the Amsterdam mine disaster were interred Sunday in one grave. The funeral was preceded by a parade over a mile long. It was participated in by all the miners from adjoining mines, by the Odd Fellows and the Red Men's lodges with practically every available carriage in use. A guard of honor of sixteen miners accompanied the body of each victim of the explosion at the Y. & O. mine to the Amsterdam graveyard.

One immense grave had been excavated for the victims. The coffins were set down and the funeral procession filed past the coffins and the grave after which they were laid one by one in the ground. The funeral exercises were participated in by Rev. Huston, of the Presbyterian church, Rev. Sullivan, of the Methodist church John Kerr for the Miners' union, Prof T. J. Bell for the Odd Fellows and Henry Hossman for the Red Men. The music was furnished by the Amsterdam band and the Wolf run band.

The services was most impressive and quite a little excitement was occasioned when Miss Haynes a young woman in attendance, fainted.

At the same hour the services was in progress here similar services were being held over three other victims in the Catholic church at Dillonvale.

At the mine the work of making repairs is progressing and it is the intention to start up the latter part of the week. The coroner has not as yet began an inquiry into the cause of the explosion, and will not until the end of the week when he will have the assistance of the Ohio state mine officials.
