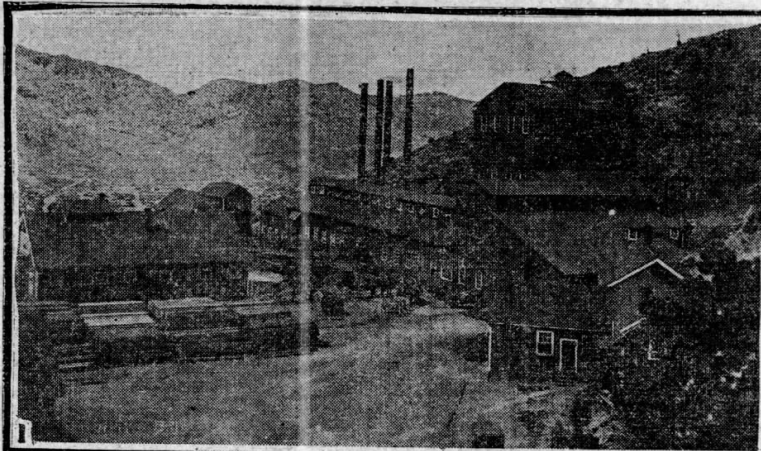


CENTENNIAL-EUREKA MINE TOMB YIELDS THREE MORE OF ITS DEAD TO RESCUERS

WORK OF PIERCING BARRIER OF EARTH PROCEEDS SLOWLY

Ten Hours Required to Extricate Body of Mike Rosa, Wedged Between Timbers; Heads of Two Uncovered

EXPECT TO FIND MORE BODIES THIS MORNING

Cause of Disaster Is Ascribed to Formation of False Roof Above the Timbered Roof Creating Space for Slide

EUREKA, Sept. 19.—Those known to be dead as a result of the catastrophe in the Centennial-Eureka mine now number five. The body of Mike Rosa was discovered at noon today pinned beneath a heavy timber and removed at 9:30 o'clock tonight. Later in the afternoon the rescuers uncovered the heads of two more miners beneath tons of earth and rock. At midnight sufficient progress had not been made to permit of their identification.

With the rescue of Jacob Pinterella late last night, six miners now remain to be accounted for. That they have met death is a conviction that is steadily gaining ground in the mining circles of the camp.

The rescue work, however, is going on without slackening. As soon as one man tires another takes his place. Inch by inch the wall that bars progress to what is expected to be the death chamber of the six yields before the onslaughts of determined workers. How far from the spot to where the rescue party has advanced these bodies may be uncovered is not definitely known. The discovery of the three bodies this afternoon indicates that the others cannot be far away.

Wedged Between Timbers.

Nearly ten hours was required to release Rosa's body after it was unearthed. It was wedged in between heavy timbers. It was decided to minimize the danger of a secondary cave-in, to timber all around the spot, before setting to work to remove the body. And while this was being done the ef-

FEDERAL RESERVE BOARD APPROVES GOLD POOL PLAN

Banks to Provide \$100,000,000 to Meet American Obligations in Europe.

Washington, Sept. 19.—The bankers' plan for a \$100,000,000 gold fund to meet American obligations to Europe was approved today by the federal reserve board.

National banks in financial centers and reserve cities will be asked to contribute to the fund, but country banks are not expected to participate.
