
CAUGHT BY RUSH OF COAL

Miner Rescued From Death After Seven Hours' Work

Shenandoah, Pa., Aug. 19.—After firing a blast at the William Penn colliery, Michael Wasso, of this city, was

caught in a rush of coal and buried up to his chin and was being gradually carried to a terrible death, down a chute, when his cries for help brought rescuers, who, by forpoling the coal, stopped the rush.

It took 12 miners seven hours to extricate the victim from his perilous position, owing to the continuous falls of top coal. Wasso collapsed five times, but a doctor on the scene revived him. He was lacerated from head to foot.

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
