

NESBITT WILL BEGIN MULGA PROBE TODAY

**Not Expected to Consume
More Than Two Days.
Funerals Yesterday**

This morning State Mine Inspector Charles H. Nesbitt will take up his investigation of the Mulga mine disaster of last Monday morning in which 16 lives were lost and 18 were injured, two seriously. The investigation is not expected to cover over two days, and the mine will resume operations at the beginning of the next week.

Yesterday at Mulga most of the funerals over the dead were conducted. It was a sombre occasion for the mining camp and the men turned out in a body to attend the last rites over the remains of their former comrades before the caskets were placed in the cemetery on the hillside. The officials of the mine were very busy throughout the day co-operating in every way possible to alleviate the conditions of the surviving relatives of the victims of Monday's accident.

Coroner Spain stated last night that he decided on a definite date for his inquest into the disaster, but would announce the date this morning. The coroner stated that he would conduct the inquest with a jury composed of the best mining authorities in the county which would try to ascertain the exact causes that led to the gas explosion.
