Death of Mulberry Victim Brought Sorrow to City.

The death of William Baird, the only one who escaped from almost immediate death in the accident the Spencer-Newland mine north district, which occurred at the Mt. Carmel hospital Saturday morning from the effects of his injuries, caused a feeling of sorrow to spread over the little city of Frontenac, closer than that of any of the other victims, because of the fact that he was reared in Frontenac and vicinity and was known by the older residents from the time he first appeared upon the streets as a youngster. He was popular and well fiked.

"The accident struck us all with horror," one citizen said, "but the death of Billy brought it close to our homes for he was so well known here. His home had been in Frontenac, except for a few years while he was serving as a soldier in the army of the United States.

Frontenac turned out to attend the funeral and many floral offerings in various designs were sent by Frontenac citizens. The funeral was held Sunday afternoon.
