EIGHTEEN LIVES IS TOLL OF DISASTER AT BOSWELL

Appalling Result of Gas Explosion in Mine of Merchants' Coal Company-Six Victims in Hospital Besides Three Times That Number Killed.

Eighteen lives was the toll of an explosion of gas Tuesday morning in Orenda mine No. 2 of the Merchants' Coal company at Boswell. Six men were injured, three of whom are in Memorial Hospital, Johnstown, in a serious condition. Sixteen of the dead who bear foreign names were not identified Tuesday night. The two Americans in the list were:

MARITIN M'GUILE, aged 32, assistant mine foreman; married; leaves widow and five small children.

FRANK BEAGLE, aged 17, miner; single.

Seriously Injured.

James Berdalena, burned over estire head and body.

George Pronast, skull and both arms fractured, slight burns.

George Pesceutz, fractured leg; slight burns.

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George Assistant mine foreman in the latter he was admitted. McGuire was fead when his body was found in the entry in which the explosion occurred, more than two miles from the mouth of the mine.

Three hundred and twenty-free men were at work in the mine at the time of the accident, which courred about 3:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, John Taylor, one of the men assigned to inspect the mine Tuesday morning, reported the presence of gas at 6:30 o'clock in an entry almost 12,000 text free from the mouth of the mine.

McGuire went in, accompanied by the miners who now constitute the list of dead. The officials of the company cannot say exactly what happened.

One supposition is that a spark from the hauling motor set off the gas. All the officials know is that a spark of fame reached the gas from some source and the explosion followed. McGuire is said to have gone alone into the entry where the gas abounded, fencing it off to prevent anyone else from entering.

This is the duty of the assistant foreman in cases where danger is known to exist. The miners who had gone in with McGuire meanwhile set to work in a parallel entry, which they did not know to be gaseous. Fourteen of the dead men perished from the afterdamp which followed the explosion. Their bodies, which were brought out late Tuesday night, did not disclose marks of violence.

Hard to Hentify Bodies.

Despite the almost perfect condition of the bodies, the company will reveal the names of the men.

Every part of the mine was explored in the search for possible in ured. When the first news of the explosion reached the surface, George Crossland, the inside superintendent with Palmer, the foreman, led a number of rescue men into the mine. This was about 9 o'clock.
