Asphyxiated Trying to Rescue Miners

Barrackville, W. Va., Oct. 20.—Superintendent L. M. Jones of the mine rescue car from Pittsburgh, was asphyxiated while trying to reach entombed men at Jamison No. 7 mine today.

Hope for the nine or more men believed to be caught in one of the mine chambers has practically been abandoned. The workings are filled with gas.

All of the six bodies taken from the mine early today were those of Americans, John Drummond, electrician, and M. W. Allison, head machinist, were among them. They were directing repair work. A number of men were injured, none seriously, when the explosion occurred. They were clustered about the shaft and were showered with debris when the gas let go.
