

ONE MORE BODY IS REMOVED FROM MINE; HORSES STILL INSIDE

FAIRMONT, W. Va., Oct. 22.—Unexpected obstacles met with in the work of removing the bodies of the dead miners from the ill-fated Jamison No. 7 mine at Barrackville are being encountered by the rescue crew at work there to-night, and at a late hour but one additional body had been recovered. That was the body of A. Wilson Vance, aged 28, married, who leaves a wife and two children. The body of Vance was recovered early to-day.

Three bodies have now been recovered in addition to the body of Vance. The body of Isaiah Leasure was recovered several days ago, as was the body of L. M. Jones, chief of the mine rescue crew sent here from Pittsburgh, who was overcome by poisonous gases and died in the mine on Friday.

Eight bodies still remain inside the mine. The rescue crew is working to recover these bodies as soon as possible. In addition to the eight men still in the mine, there are 30 head of horses in the stables in the lower shaft which must be removed later. The horses are not taken out of the mines after they go inside to work, but are stabled in the pit. There were 30 of these animals in the mine when it blew up last Thursday.
