

SLIDE YIELDS FIVE BODIES

Searchers Have Recovered All
but One Victim at North
Star Mine.

HAILEY, Ida. — Five additional bodies were taken from the debris caused by the snowslides at the North Star mine Monday making 14 so far recovered. The missing man is William S. Schmidt of Hailey. The bodies have been brought to a Hailey undertaking parlor.

The bodies recovered Monday were those of W. R. Motley of Indian Valley; Emmet P. Russell, Jack McKelvey and John Kistle, all of Hailey and John Hearn of Fairfield.

Crew Called Off.

The crew of men digging for the bodies was called off at 11 a. m. because of further danger of snowslides as the weather was warming up. Work will begin early Tuesday morning in an attempt to recover the two bodies known to be still in the ruins.

Of the injured men two are in a very serious condition. Of these Arthur E. Wood, who was in charge of the tramway at the mine, is being sent by the Federal company to St. Luke's hospital in Boise. His wife, who has been with him at the mine, will accompany him. His hip is broken and back seriously injured. William Moore, who had his collarbone and several ribs broken, has developed a case of pneumonia from the accident and may not recover. The rest of the injured are all doing well and may be considered out of danger.

John Purnell, one of the dead men, was from Boise.

Funerals Wednesday.

The funerals of most of the dead will be held Wednesday. Four of them were members of the local aerie of Eagles and will be buried under the auspices of that order. Manager E. Percy Smith states that as soon as danger of slides has passed, crews of men will be put to work cleaning up the debris and getting the compressors in shape to continue work in the mine. Further plans will be decided upon after Frederick Burbidge, of Wallace, general manager of the Federal company, arrives. He will probably come the latter part of the week.
