

ONE ENTOMBED MINER IS RESCUED ALIVE

Second Victim of Mine Flood
Believed to Be Buried Under
Debris

Shamokin, Pa., June 11.—Headed by high officials of the Reading Coal and Iron Company, rescuers have been at work 60 hours endeavoring to locate Vistor Aughustine, one of the two men caught in a breast at Henry Clay colliery yesterday, when a body of water mysteriously broke into the workings.

Bart Mirolli, one of the two men entombed, was rescued alive. He had been swept into a heading and was in a semi-conscious condition when reached. He is in the Shamokin hospital with several ribs broken, one of which penetrated the lungs, causing an injury likely to result fatally.

Aughustine, according to Mirolli's statement during a lucid interval, took refuge in a "blind" heading, a hole in the coal near the face of a working place. To reach him it is necessary to drive a hole through a pillar. It is the belief of officials that Aughustine was buried under debris or drowned.

State mine inspectors are investigating the cause of the sudden rush of water.
