

STILL SEEK BODIES AT POUNDING MILL

Three Victims Beneath Mass of Rock — Large Rescue Party at Work

Three of the mine bodies buried beneath the thousands of tons of limestone rock blown down by a premature explosion at the W. W. Boxley & Company's quarry, near Pounding Mill, Va., Friday morning, had not been recovered yesterday afternoon. A rescue party of over two hundred men have been working every minute since noon Friday, but no trace of the three victims had been found, according to the latest information from Pounding Mill.

W. W. Boxley, of this city, who is owner of the quarry and crusher plant, is at Pounding Mills with big ditching machines obtained from the Virginian railway.

Norfolk and Western wreck cars have been at work on the huge mass of stone since mid-night Friday. Additional forces have been sent to the scene of the explosion by the Norfolk and Western railway.

Reports reaching here yesterday were to the effect that the bodies of the victims found were not located at the point where it was first presumed they would be found.
