George Temby, of Local Birth, Killed in Mine Disaster

George Temby of this city, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Temby of Bennett street, was killed in the cavein which entombed seven miners at the Carbonado mine of the Pacific Coast Coal Company at Carbonado, Washington, last Friday. The Union carried an Associated Press dispatch of the cavein in yesterday's paper, but it was not known at the time that the local man was in any way connected with the disaster.

Mr. Temby moved away from Grass Valley about 15 years ago. It is not known how long he was stationed at the mine where the cavein occurred.

William Temby was born and raised in Grass Valley, and is well known to hundreds of residents of this place. He is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Temby, and is survived by a wife and daughter; a brother, Albert, of Idaho, and Mrs. Fred Jones of Los Angeles; Mrs. John Angove of Grass Valley; Mrs. Lizzie Couch, San Francisco; Mrs. Carrie West, Harrington, Wash., sisters, and another brother, Christopher Temby, of Sacramento.

SEATTLE, April 8.— (AP) —Seven men were believed to have been entombed in a cavein today at the Carbonado mine of the Pacific Coast Coal Company, 50 miles south of here. The vice president of the company, after a survey of the disaster, expressed only slight hope that any of the men would be taken out alive.

In addition to the seven men believed to be entombed, one was partially buried by the cavein and was rescued with only slight injuries. All miners of the company have been trained in rescue work.

The bodies of two of the seven miners entombed were brought to the surface tonight.

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
