"All of the widows and orphans are automatically cared for under the workmen's compensation act as far as the law permits," Bowman said. "I realize that many people would be glad to contribute further assistance and they probably would welcome it. But anything started at this time, supposedly to give aid to these people, will bear looking into by the authorities."

Bowman said he had received reports that solicitations were made today in Olympia, Seattle and Tacoma.
