

# 160 KILLED IN MINE BLAST IN MILLFIELD, O.

## Last of Bodies of Victims Brought to Surface At 7:30 a. m. Today

### President, Vice President of Company Killed While They Toured Mine

**MILLFIELD, Ohio** — Number six mine of the Sunday Creek Coal company yielded the last of its dead at 7:30 a. m. today when the seventy-sixth body of men who met death when an explosion and fire wrecked underground workings yesterday was brought to the surface. Eighteen have been rescued alive but in serious condition.

**MILLFIELD** — Between 150 and 160 persons were killed in a gas explosion and fire in Number 6 mine of the Sunday Creek Coal company. Among the dead are five officials of the mine, including President W. E. Tytus, of Columbus, Ohio., Vice-president P. A. Coen of Columbus who, with guests, were inspecting the mine.

Authorities who traversed the mine said that they saw bodies everywhere. There was no sign of life.

No bodies had been recovered at 10 p. m. Wednesday but rescue work is expected to start soon. Subsequently rescue crews discovered 20 men alive in a side tunnel, all seriously injured and gassed. No others are believed to have escaped.

**MILLFIELD, Ohio** — One miner is known to be killed and approximately 145 others were entombed in number 6 mine of the Sunday Creek Coal Co., here in a terrific explosion, followed by fire.

Those familiar with mine disasters be large.

The explosion is attributed to feared that the death tolls would gas. Some of the gassed and injured miners reached the surface.

**COLUMBUS** — Reports that 160 men were killed in an explosion which wrecked the Millfield number 6 mine near Athens, Ohio, Wednesday afternoon, were received by Governor Cooper last night. The governor announced that his representatives at the scene of the explosion reported 160 dead and that immediate relief was needed for the distressed relatives of the victims
