

## 2 Men Released From Mine After 6 Hours' Entombment

**CARBONDALE, Aug. 24.**—Edward DeLaney, Mill street, Simpson, and Nicholas Muschamto, Mayfield, miners at the No. 3 shaft, Hudson Coal company, were entombed for more than six hours by a rock fall on Saturday afternoon and made their way to safety only after rescue workers drove a tunnel through the debris. Presence of mind of the men, who are said to have run behind the fall as they heard the roof cracking over them, saved the two from being crushed under the rock and coal, it is reported. Neither of the men was injured.

When the report of the accident first was received in the central city it was rumored that several men had been killed. Officials of the concern would give out no information in regard to the mishap but stated that no great damage was done and that none was injured. The men were said to have been engaged in timbering off the main road when the squeeze occurred. The fall took place at 2 o'clock on Saturday afternoon and the men were not released until after 8 p. m.

Several other employes who were engaged in the section where the fall took place made their way outside before the roof collapsed, according to unofficial reports. The rescue squad brought the entombed men to safety without any great difficulty, it was stated.
