

GRASS VALLEY MINER EFFECTS HEROIC RESCUE

Carries Stricken Companion 4,000 Feet To Hoist

GRASS VALLEY (Nevada Co.),
Jan. 26.—A heroic rescue of Russell
Miller, victim of bad air in the
Pennsylvania Mine. occurred Tuesday, when Donald Pascoe, a voung
miner, descended alone into the
mine and found Miller in an unconscious condition at the bottom
of a winze on the 1,700-foot lovel.
Pascoe, himself feeling the effects of the impure air occasioned
by the fact the ventilating equipment of the mine was out of commission through lack of water, succeeded in transporting Miller a distance of 4,000 feet to the hoisting
station, where he was taken to the
surface.

Milse Companion.

Miller, Pascoe and Sam Veale
were sent into the mine to adjust
pumps and other machinery for a
temporary shutdown. Pascoe and
Veale completed their work and returned to the surface, only to find
that Miller had not appeared. It
was then that Pascoe re-entered
the mine alone to search for his
companion.

A shut-down at the Pennsylvania
was forced by the snow-clogged
water supply ditches.
