

KOSIK HAS NO COMMENT ON INGLIS STATEMENT

**PRESIDENT OF MINERS' UNION
SAYS HEAD OF GLEN ALDEN
IS ENTITLED TO HIS
OPINION.**

President M. J. Kosik, of the United Mine Workers of America in the Scranton district, said today he has no comment to make on the statement made yesterday by President W. W. Inglis of the Glen Alden Coal Company, relative to moves being fathered in Harrisburg for regulation of the anthracite industry. Major Inglis said that if politicians did not keep their hands off the industry and if leaders of the union did not halt efforts to pile further expenses on the industry, coal companies would be selling coal by the hod instead of by the carload.

"Major Inglis is entitled to his opinion," said the miners' leader. "Representatives of all districts of the union in the state are to meet in Harrisburg Tuesday and discuss the subject of legislation for the industry."

Except to say that the reports of the United States bureau of mines and the state mine inspectors are very much at variance, President Kosik also declined comment on the report that the mine inspectors have found neither the Volpe Coal Company nor employees responsible for the explosion which caused the deaths of ten men in the company's Butler slope, Pittston township, June 2.

"It has been announced that an inquest will be held Tuesday night and the miners' union will be represented at the hearing," he said.
