

**RESCUED MINER
DIES OF INJURY**

**Cave-in Costs Life of
Riverton Man**

BINGHAM, Nov. 3—Keith Brown, 28-year-old Riverton miner, died in the Bingham hospital at 7:15 a. m. Friday of a broken neck suffered early Thursday in a mine cave-in.

The victim's brother, Burl Brown, 32, of 539 East Fifth South street, Salt Lake City, was in fairly good condition. He suffered several broken ribs in the same accident.

Officials of the Combined Metals Reduction company said the cave-in occurred about 1:30 a. m. Thursday in a slope of the company's Butterfield canyon mine when timbering gave way while the two men were working.

Both men were almost completely buried under timbers and earth and were rescued with difficulty. Burl Brown aided his rescue by crawling out of his hip-length rubber boots, but it was almost two hours before his brother was extricated.

The scene of the accident is approximately 15 miles south of Bingham. A total of 65 men are employed on the workings under property leases.

E. A. Hodges, state metal mines inspector, began an investigation into the accident Friday on his return from southern Utah. Preliminary investigation was made Thursday afternoon by an assistant.

Survivors include the victim's widow; two daughters, Shirley, 4, and Margaret Brown, 2; five brothers, Burl of Salt Lake City, Darrell and Merrill of Riverton, William of Hazelton, Idaho, and Paul Brown of Fallon, Nev., and two sisters, Mrs. Merl Heas of Reno, Nev., and Mrs. Vern Rankin of Fresno, Cal.

Funeral services have been set tentatively for Monday.
