Bishop, Va. (P) — An un- identified disturbance today trapped 22 miners in a sec- tion of the Pocahontas Fuel Co.'s Bishop Mine No. 34. The extant of the damage or the condition of the men could not be determined im- mediately. The trouble disrupted communications to the sec-
tion. Mine officials said 166 other men in the mine when trouble occurred at 8:20 a.m. walked out. None suffered any ill effects.
Roland C. Luther, vice president of the company, at a press conference told newsmen it was "a local disturbance" and occurred in the "dayheading sec- tion."
"I prefer not to use the word explosion," said Luther, "because we don't know what it was."
He said, however, the dis- turbance apparently was not very powerful because it was hardly felt at the elevator shaft a little more than a mile from the scene.
Luther said the ventila- tion system in the mine areas reached by rescuers had not been damaged, indicating the disturbance was not of too great a magnitude. He said this gave hopes the trapped men could be
Of the 166 miners who es- caped, those working closest to the disturbance sealed themselves off but later were removed.
Luther said the disturb- ance occurred in the same section but a little further down from the Feb. 4, 1957, explosion scene. Thir- ty-seven men died in that disaster.
As four rescue squads ar- rived, several hundred per- sons, including families of the trapped men and their colleagues who had escaped, milled about the mine en- trance.
The rescue teams went down into the mine in relays of two, with about 15 men working at a time.
