bility the entombed miners had
taken double precaution to prevent smoke and gas fumes from
reaching in mass quantity the
area in which they barricaded
themselves.

He said the air at a point about 300 feet in front of the area giving rise to the feeling some type of barricade might have been set up to prevent the deadly air from rushing to the area they picked to await help.

Rescue team members said the going was "tough" as they moved into the area.

"The smoke is so dense you can poke your finger in it, pull it out and leave a hole," said Paul Lane, a rescue team leader. Lane also is an employe of the safety department for a not her Island Creek mine.

He also provided some idea of the intense heat workers had to contend with. "It was the best turkish bath I ever had," he said.

These statements were made during the news conference called early this morning after rescue teams had decided to use the three avenues of approach in an attempt to reach the trapped men.

Company officials participating remained confident the men would be found alive. Salvati expressed to such optimism.

"We are confident the men took the proper precautions in preparing to wait for rescue teams," he said. "I believe we will find the men alive."
