Die in Mine After Blast **Explosion Shreds** Timber, Steel At Herrin, Ill. HERRIN, Ill. (UPI) - Rescue workers emerged from an explosion-shattered coal mine today and said there were no survivors among the 11 men trapped below. Huddled at Air Vent William Orlandi, Illinois state director of mines and minerals. said most of the dead miners were found at the end of a 500foot tunnel, huddled near an air vent 168 feet below ground. The men of the second shift of the Blue Blaze Mine Co.'s No. 2 mine apparently never had chance when the blast erupted with a roar Wednesday night. Despite the obvious slim odds. a life-line of rescue workers burdened with oxygen tanks had risked death in searching for any possible survivors. The explosion site was 21/2 miles northwest of Herrin and a mile from the smaller community of Carterville. Herrin is 90 miles southeast of St. Louis.
