BARNES HECKER MINE CATASTROPHE SCENE

Marquette, Nov. 3.—From 40 to 65 men are believed to have drowned when they were caught, about 11:30 this morning, in the third level of the Barnes Hecker mine in the North Lake location eight miles west of Ishpeming by a caving of water and quick sand which occurred about a quarter of a mile east of the mine shaft.

The caving left a pit in the surface 300 feet long and 200 feet wide. The mud and water dropped 600 feet to the first level, and along that level to the shaft and dropped to the bottom of the shaft. The shaft was filled up quickly and the miners were caught on the third level. All men working in the level were believed to have drowned.

The Barnes Hecker shaft is 1,060 feet deep and at 5 o'clock this afternoon, it was filled with water and mud to a point 225 feet below the surface.

From the third level of the Barnes Hecker mine, a tunnel leads to North Lake mine No. 1, 2 miles east, and this tunnel which was the only avenue of escape, was filled up rapidly.

Several rescuers who attempted to reach the men through the tunnel were forced to turn back in order to save their own lives. They reported that they saw the bodies of four or five men.

Rescue forces were quickly organized this afternoon and early this evening, the work of bailing the mine started.

Among the men known to have been lost are W. B. Hill, mine inspector of Marquette county, and William Tippet, captain of the mine. There were three fathers and three sons in the party on the third level and all are believed to be lost.

The Barnes Hecker mine is operated by the Cleveland Cliffs Iron Company. Company officials at 6 o'clock tonight did not know the names of the men caught in the caving because it was not yet time to check them against the men who reported to the office. The work of bailing was being pushed as rapidly as possible and at 6 o'clock, it was said the water was receding.

The accident is said to be one of the worst, if not the worst, in the history of iron ore mining in the Lake Superior district. It is recalled here that three or four years ago the Milford mine on the Cuyuna range was flooded when the lake bottom broke through, and that a large number of men were drowned. Twenty-five years ago a large group of men were drowned in the Mansfield mine at Crystal Falls when the river bottom broke through into the mine.
