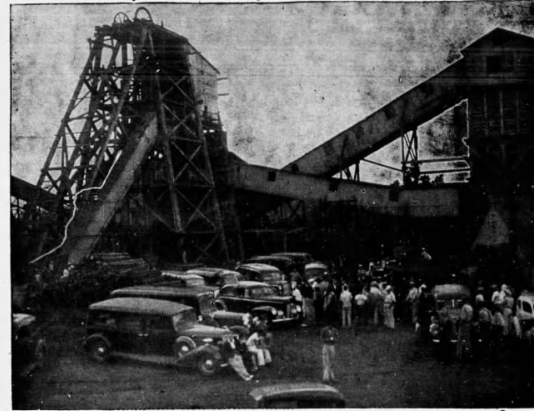
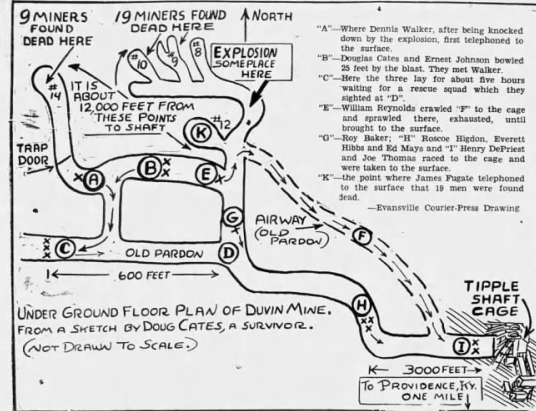


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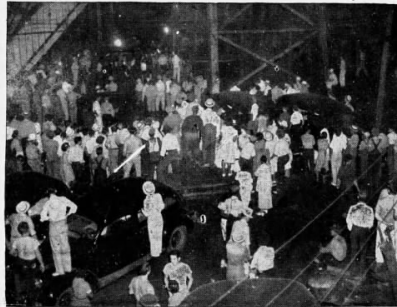

The tipple of Duvin mine is shown here. The cars shown here are ambulances kept waiting at the mouth of the mine.



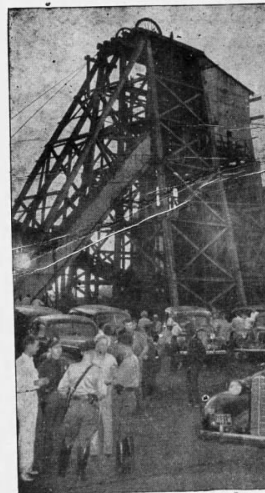
