KELLOGG'S JURY PROBES MINE DISASTER

Verdict Declares Accident Unavoidable Witnesses Tell of Events Surrounding District's Major Underground Mine Accident

A coroner's jury today investigated the accident at the Morning mine of the Federal M. & S. company, which killed 10 men. After hearing all the evidence the jury of six men returned a verdict that the disaster was an unavoidable accident.

The jury's verdict was as follows: "In the matter of the investigation of the accident occurring at the Morning mine on October 6, 1936:

"We, the undersigned jurymen, called to investigate and decide as to the type of accident which occurred on this date, do decide that it was an unavoidable accident."

"All of which we duly certify in writing by us signed this 7th day of October, 1936."

The jurymen were Paul H. Datzle, insurance man, former Shoshone county probate judge; S. H. Fairweather, insurance man and republican candidate for probate judge; M. J. Korbach, Wallace grocerman; J. H. Fox, retired miner; William Muller, Wallace, county highway engineer; and J. W. Osborne, Wallace, clerk.

Witnesses Called:
The case was submitted to the jury at 11:44 o'clock this morning after 11 witnesses had been called by Arthur Campbell, state insurance inspector; Dr. H. C. Mowery, Shoshone county coroner and John L. Fitzgerald, prosecuting attorney. A courtroom crowded with spectators, many of them Morning mine employees or relatives and friends of the 10 victims of yesterday's tragedy, heard the testimony.

Witnesses called were:
Con Johnson, Morning mine pumpman; E. J. Borg, general superintendent of the Federal Mining and Smelting company; James H. Pratt, head rope man; Leslie Fisher, a mine foreman in charge of the "graveyard" shift at the time of the accident; Axel Berglund, hostman on duty when the case fell; Henry Aimes, shaft boss, cage on duty at the 2050 level; Earl Mender, shift boss on the 2050 level; C. L. Burch, shift boss of the 2400; Oscar Wolford, miner on 2050 level; Axel E. Johnson, engineer in charge of the mine safety department and M. G.
