The accident occurred early this afternoon, when a big tractor operating on the surface crashed into some old workings, precipitating a shower of giant boulders into the open cut in which the two miners were working.

George Frazier of Fair Oaks, driver of the tractor, suffered a slight leg injury clambering over rocks to the entrapped men.

Headed by Coroner A. J. Orelli of El Dorado County, the rescue workers labored in short shifts, taking turns at swinging the heavy sledges which were their only weapon in the attack upon the wall of rock.
