CONSCRIPT BILL'S PROHIBITION TO PASS BOTH HOUSES

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 28.—The administration forces won over new opponents of conscription in the Senate today, voting 73 to 26 to strike the name of the measure from the calendar. This measure passed the House by a vote of 219 to 151.

Representative Platt, of New York, pointed out that no draft law had been made up to the present time. Representative Randall predicted that at conference between the two houses, the age problem would be put back to between 18 and 25.

Amendments raising the age above 18 were defeated. The substitute amendment by Senator Harding, authorizing the president to regulate the sale of liquor to armed forces, prohibiting the sale at any point, and trading stamps, was adopted by a vote of 51 to 32.

DISASTER DUE TO EXPLOSION FIRE CREWS WORK FRUITLESSLY FOREIGN PLOTTING INVESTIGATED

TRINIDAD, Colo., April 28.—There was no escape for the 120 or more men caught behind the fire in the Hastings mine of the Victor-American company near Leadville, when an explosion occurred yesterday. The explosion was caused by an explosion. The possibility of foreign agents being responsible is being investigated.

Superintendent Cameron said he had little hope of saving any of the men who were in the mine when the explosion occurred. At noon today the rescue party reported the fire out.

The burning mine hangs over the canyon. Above the workings where the men were entombed is a level with an abandoned tunnel that has been after and smoldering for several years but which is sealed. Air ducts run in to the mine where the men were trapped. Air is being pumped through, hoping to reach the men. As smoke continues to pour out, officials fear the air ducts are broken and that the air is only fainting the flames.
