## CONYNGHAM MINE DISASTER MADE 9 WIDOWS AND 34 ORPHANS

As a result of the accident which occurred at the Conyngham colliery of the D. & H. Col. early yesterday morning, nine men were killed and thirty-four children are left orphans.

The people of the upper end of the city have not yet recovered from the shock of the appalling accident, and a gloom seems to pervade the entire neighborhood. All afternoon yesterday and all of this morning the people of Underkuffler's Marcy & Co. store were besieged with a throng of men and women, each anxious to view the remains, and while many were attracted to the scene out of mere curiosity, others were in search of friends and many pathetic scenes were witnessed.

The bodies of the victims were identified by friends, the identification being the same as that made by the officials at the mine yesterday and published in the TIMES last evening.

This morning Attorney W. B. Carter, deputy coroner, visited the morgue, together with the jury empaneled to view the remains and later the bodies were removed to their respective homes. The jury was composed of the following: A. Barnes, J. B. Carter, Dr. B. F. Moxey, John Crawford and Thomas P. Williams. They will meet on Monday next, May 1, in the morgue office to hear testimony in the case and the investigation promises to be most rapid.

The funeral of most of the victims will be held to-morrow and it is hardly probable that work will be resumed at the colliery before Monday next, as the majority of the victims will attend the funerals of their comrades.

After the bodies of the victims had been viewed by the jury, they were removed to their homes. The body taken from the morgue being that of Leontine Wark, who was killed by a falling rock, the remains being taken in charge by Underkuffler A. Kunk.

The second body, that of James McInnes, was taken in charge shortly after by Underkuffler Druggist, who removed the remains of the deceased and who also took charge of the remains of Anthony and Michael Zaganore, or Zaganore, who also were removed as rapidly as possible, a record of each body and by whom removed being taken up by a list of terms every one of the ten victims, with one exception, had been taken to his home.

REFUSED TO RECEIVE REMAINS.  
The one exception was that of the remains of Harry McGraw, Police, the only strike man among the victims who boarded with a family in Georgetown. The woman with whom McGraw boarded absolutely refused to receive the body into her home and the victim will likely be buried from Underkuffler McLaughlin's establishment, McGraw, as far as could be learned, had no relatives in the city.

When this woman learned yesterday that McGraw was among the victims she hurried to the office of the colliery where the accident occurred and offered the officials of the company pay her a heartily long owing to the deceased amounting to \$14. Her request was refused and she left in an angry frame of mind, refusing to give her address.

THIS MORNING Supt. Superintendent Samuel R. Morgan sent a man to Georgetown to try and locate the residence. This man returned shortly after 11 o'clock with the statement that he had found the house, but as soon as he stated the object of his visit the woman slammed the door in his face.

NEARLY ALL FOREIGNERS.  
Nearly all the victims were Polish, there being but three of the entire number who could speak the English language. They were: William F. CLAIMING FOR THE DEAD.  
Underkuffler Marcy was besieged this morning by relatives of the deceased who demanded that they be allowed to remove their dear ones to their homes and it was with difficulty they could be restrained, being seemingly unable to understand why it was necessary to remove the remains to the morgue to be viewed by the jury.

When Supt. Morgan visited the morgue he was surrounded by these men, who beseeched him to allow them to take the remains home.

## CASES ON TRIAL IN CRIMINAL COURT TO-DAY

For assaulting and resisting Judge J. B. Carter, a public officer, Anthony P. Borky and Michael Vechovsky of Middle Creek, were tried before Judge Wharton in court room No. 2 this morning. According to evidence it appears that a wedding was being held at Vechovsky's when the two men, who were charged with assault on one of the guests who was charged with larceny. In the performance of his duty Judge Carter, the defendant assaulted him and resisted arrest. The charge was denied by the defendant. Assistant District Attorney Salsburg was for the Commonwealth and Attorney Frank McCracken represented the defendants. The case was given to the jury shortly before court adjourned at noon to-day.

Charged with larceny as a servant, J. B. Barrett, of this city, was tried before Judge Carter in court room No. 2 this morning. J. B. Blake, of Beranton, the prosecutor, alleged that Barrett was employed by him as a salesman and that he sold two suitcases and received the money for them and did not deliver the suitcases. Assistant District Attorney Salsburg was for the Commonwealth and Attorney Frank McCracken represented the defendant. The case was given to the jury shortly before court adjourned at noon to-day.

John Kondrack, of Plymouth, was placed on trial before Judge Wharton in court room No. 2 this afternoon on the charge of larceny, preferred by J. E. Kucharski, a merchant of that place. According to the story told by the prosecutor, Kondrack stole a suit from a customer and fled with it. A number of witnesses testified to the fact that Kondrack had stolen the suit and that he had been seen running away with it. Assistant District Attorney Salsburg was for the Commonwealth and Attorney Charles R. Lenahan appeared for the defendant.

HUGHES NOT GUILTY.  
White Hughes, of Pottsville, who was charged with embezzlement of \$2.50 by J. W. White, of Pottsville, was tried before Judge Carter this morning. Hughes was charged with the crime of embezzlement of the money to his own use. A number of witnesses testified to the fact that Hughes had embezzled the money and that he had been seen running away with it. Assistant District Attorney Salsburg was for the Commonwealth and Attorney Charles R. Lenahan appeared for the defendant. The case was given to the jury shortly before court adjourned at noon to-day.

PURE FLOOD CASES SETTLED.  
John P. Jones and Joseph H. Harty, of Beranton, two of the defendants in the pure flood case, were tried before Judge Carter this morning. They pleaded guilty to the crime of pure flooding and were each fined \$100 and costs. The case was given to the jury shortly before court adjourned at noon to-day.
