TEN MEN DASHED TO A HORRIBLE DEATH BY BREAKING OF ROPE ON CARRIAGE IN CONYNGHAM SHAFT

Accident Occured as Hundreds of Miners Were Being Lowered Into the Underground Chambers to Begin Their Dangerous Tasks for the Day

UNFORTUNATE TOILERS PLUNGED GREAT DISTANCE IN SUMP

Third Accident Which Has Occurred in the Mining District of the Wyoming Valley During the Past Six Months and the List of Killed Now Numbers More Than Two Score, Due

It is Thought, to Negligence On the Part of the Coal Companies

THREE BROKEN CABLES KILL TWENTY-SEVEN WORKMEN IN LESS THAN SIX MONTHS' TIME

Auschlous disaster, at Nanticoke, Nov. 2, 1904. Ten men were dropped 1800 feet to the bottom of the shaft when Engineer Jacob Fine lost control of his engine. After four days of hard work, the rescuers' journey ceased the bodies from the bottom of a sump 300 feet deep, which was filled with water.

Clear Spring disaster, at West Pittston, March 9, 1905. Seven men were dropped to their death by the breaking of the cable attached to the cage on which the victims were being lowered into the mines. The coroner's jury failed to find any person or persons to blame for the accident.

Conyngnam disaster, at Wilkes-Barre, April 26, 1905. By the parting of the cable, in what is known as the "man shaft," ten men were hurled 400 feet to their deaths. All of the bodies were recovered four hours after the accident, horribly mangled.

Miners' mine accidents have occurred in this vicinity recently, but perhaps the most horrible was one which occurred on the morning of April 26, 1905, at the Conyngnam shaft of the Delaware and Hudson Company. Ten men were dropped a distance of 400 feet from the shaft to an awful death in the sump of the shaft, 500 feet from the surface. The parting of the rope, allowing the mine car to drop, was the cause of the accident.

John Chase, miner, married, wife and four children, Resided at North Main and Fifth streets. James Marzariello, miner, married, wife and six children, Resided in Georgetown. Anthony Zavanis, miner, leave wife and no children, Resided in Georgetown. William T. Henry, miner, married, wife and two children, Resided at North Pennsylvania avenue.

The usual hour for beginning work at the mine is 7 o'clock. The morning of the accident, the men, as was their custom, gathered at the mouth of the shaft at about 6 o'clock and two carriages of ten men were lowered to the bottom without mishap. The carriage was again drawn to the surface and men rushed to the cage to get a place that they might get at their work early.

Nan Patterson was brought from the jail by the constable Stern and after the latter's testimony was taken back to the Tombs. Hyman Stern was then called to the witness stand and he testified that he had sold the revolver to a man who he could not identify.
